Sight Words

Sight word testing will resume this week, so please continue to practice regularly with your child. I would encourage you to go back and practice words from previous lists as well to ensure that your child still recognize all of the words. If you find that your child has forgotten many of the words from previous lists, it would be wise to go back and focus on those words, before continuing with the new lists. Remember, the first few lists are the most important as they are the most commonly used words in text.

We will continue to maintain the same schedule wherein half of the class will be tested on Tuesday and the last half of the class, on Thursday. If you are available on Tuesday mornings and would like to join our sight word team, please let me know.




French

This month we will be working on clothing and winter vocabulary. The clothing flashcards with be sent home shortly and the winter ones will follow. At this point in the year your child should be recognizing the picture and also starting to read the words. To help your child begin sounding out their French words I have included a list of French sounds that we have been practicing in class, as well as a small guide to aid in pronunciation.

ou- like the 'oo' of school
ch- like the 'sh' sound in English
é/er/ez- like the 'ay' in the word day
au/eau- like the 'oa' in the word boat
oi- like the 'wa' in the word water

The following two sounds are considered nasal vowels, which do not have an English equivalent. The closest equivalent would be the sound in the suggested word, if said with your nose plugged.

on-like the 'on" in don't an/en-like the 'an' in want



Before Christmas break, we began our addition and subtraction unit (up to 12). We have been focusing on breaking down the numbers, but mainly, students are learning to truly understand the concept of part-part-whole. The basis of addition and subtraction is knowing that parts make up a whole and that a whole can be broken into parts. These ideas are known as composing and decomposing. This concept helps move your child past seeing 8 as just 8 objects and helping them see it as 7 and 1, 6 and 2, and so on. This is incredibly important so that your child can easily decompose larger numbers to make equations easier. For example: 27+9 can be seen as 28+8 or 30+6, each of these is a simpler equation to solve than 27+9.

Here are a couple of ways to help build this part-part-whole skill at home:

 When giving your child snacks, give it to them in two piles. Instead of giving them all 5 crackers, give them 2 and then 3 off to the side and say "You get two and three, how many do you have?"

2. Play Cover Up. This can also be done when eating a snack. Have them count how many they have and then cover some up with your hand and see if they can tell you how many you covered up. For example, if they have 5 crackers, after they count them, cover up 2 with your hand and say "You had 5, now you have three out here and the rest are in my hand. How many are in my hand?"

You can also reinforce these concepts at home by having your child tell Math stories, such as the ones listed below. You can then ask your child to show you how to solve the question using manipulatives or even a drawing.

## There are 4 boys playing outside; 6 girls come to join them. How many children are there now?

There are 12 children playing at the park; five decide to leave. How many children are left at the park?

## **Book Envelopes**

Students will continue to bring home their 'Just Right' book bags from now until the end of the year. Please be aware that they will soon be choosing both English and French books to bring home. Some of these books will be made in class and can be kept at home once it has been practiced. Your child should be able to read these independently. These books contain many of the vocabulary and sight words that we have been practicing in class and they are perfect for beginning French

readers!
