

<u>Math</u>

In math, we are continuing to work on our numbers up to 100. We are beginning to count large sets of items in a variety of ways: by 1s (up to 100), by 2s (up to 20) and by 5s and 10s (uo to 100). Please be sure that your child can recite the proper number sequence when skip counting and that he/she understands how and when to properly use skip counting to determine the number of items in a set.

In this unit, we have also been working on identifying and representing numbers to 100 symbolically. This can often be a bit of a challenge, as the numbers from 60-100 are especially tricky in French.

We are using a really great app in class to help with this. It is called *Blips!*Intégral; however, it is unfortunately not free...



Science

We are continuing to work on our Building Things unit and are currently testing out different materials that we will ultimately use in our final build. Students have built a variety of objects and we've had a lot of fun! We have participated in different STEM challenges are currently building a marble run. Thank you for all of the materials that you have sent in. Please continue to send in your recyclables and other 'beautiful junk' for the next few weeks, we are running out of items. We have also taken pause throughout the year to talk about seasonal changes as these come up. Your child is currently being evaluated on the seasonal changes associated with winter.

Social Studies

English

Students are being asked to continue practicing their sight words and reading nightly at home. I cannot stress enough how much of an impact that this practice makes in your child's progress. They sure have come a long way since September! Now that they are reading books, which are getting longer and more complex, it is important to ensure that your child is comprehending what they are reading. It is not uncommon for kids to 'word read' rather than to fully understand what they are reading. Take the time to stop periodically and ask your child what the book they are reading is about. This will help to cue them to do this independently as well. We continue to work on reading strategies daily and have lots of opportunities to explore reading and writing in the classroom.

French

As we progress through our year the amount of French that the students are reading, writing and producing orally is growing. Hopefully you have been taking the opportunity to read the levelled French readers that are being brought home with your child. Most of these books should be simple enough for your child to read on their own with limited assistance. Don't worry if you can't read or understand the books yourself. Just sitting and listening to your child read in French is a big help. Remember, French is very phonetic, so when in doubt, ask your child to look for French combos and sound the word out.

A reminder as well that reviewing the French flash cards that have been sent home throughout the year will also help your child to develop their oral French skills as well as support their reading.
